

WHO IS YNOT?


The Youth Network of Tasmania (YNOT) is the peak body for young people aged 12-25 years and the youth sector in Tasmania.

The Tasmanian Youth Forum (TYF) is one of the largest youth consultative events for young people aged 12-25 years in Tasmania.

TYF brings young people together from across the State to discuss matters important and relevant to them, as well as identify solutions and ideas to improve outcomes for young people and their communities.


Outcomes and findings from TYF are then compiled into a single report and delivered to Government and decision makers to help them better understand some of the issues and challenges facing young people.



TYF 2021 was developed in consultation with a youth focus group, comprised of six young Tasmanians aged 15-21 years from around the State.

The TYF youth focus group shared their thoughts and experiences on how youth organisations engage with young people, the good and the bad, and outlined what they think underpins meaningful youth consultation.

Importantly, the group said that they wanted to see their voices captured and shared with adults and decision makers; in turn making them feel heard, valued and respected for their participation.

WHAT YOUNG PEOPLE HAVE TO SAY ABOUT TRANSPORT IN TASMANIA...

KEY FINDINGS FROM TYF 2021

This year, 388 young Tasmanians aged 12-25 years had their say on transport in Tasmania! This is what you said...

Access to affordable, available, appropriate, and fit-for-purpose public transport is a key issue for young Tasmanians.

Young people want to see eco-friendly transport and increased public and shared transport options to reduce the impacts of transport on the environment.

Many young people feel unsafe on buses because of bullying and bad behaviour from passengers, unsafe driving and poor bus conditions.

Young people are concerned about how they will get to school or work using public transport.

Young people want safer shared roads for cars, public transport, cyclists and pedestrians, with more responsible drivers and no hooning.

Public transport is not always accessible to everyone in the community, particularly those living with a disability or experiencing sensory issues.

Transport costs are too high for young people, especially for people with low incomes, living in rural areas, and those who don't qualify for other transport subsidies.

IDEAS AND SOLUTIONS FROM YOUNG PEOPLE

Add more road safety education in schools, starting younger and continuing throughout secondary school.

Use dedicated bus services for schools and colleges to help young people feel safer.

Invest more in carbon-neutral public transport systems and electric vehicles.

Offer bus timetables in braille and other popular languages in the community.

> Improve safety at bus stops with CCTV cameras, lighting and real-time bus timetable monitoring.

Look at innovative, flexible transport options in rural communities and outlying suburbs, like shuttles and minibuses or subsidised shared vehicle taxis.

Have a responsible adult on school buses to ensure duty of care if young people experience bullying, violence or other safety concerns.

Make all public buses wheelchair accessible, and accessible to people of all abilities.

> More bus options on popular routes, later at night and between communities.

Engage with young people before implementing large changes to Tasmania's transport systems.

More learner-driver mentor programs and free or subsidised driving lessons for young people.

Make all transport free for school and college students, and all people disadvantaged due to disability, homelessness, remoteness, or low income.



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WHAT IS YOUR HOPE OR VISION FOR TRANSPORT IN TASMANIA?



"Better drivers. At least everyday I hear my dad say 'where did that person get their licence?"" - Emma, 13



"My hope is for accessible and frequent services to the outer eastern-shore and northern suburbs. For public transport to be more affordable, environmentally friendly, SAFE and welcoming. To do this we need better management of taxpayer funds, consultation with different community stakeholders (not businesses), utilise alternative traffic minimisation methods (like bus lanes, existing railway corridors, bike racks), greater customer service training and conflict resolution training for public transport staff and inclusivity and diversity training to support the many disabled and non-English speaking people who use their services."
